As with the entire community, the City of Irvine proudly supports its veterans, through programs and support services, annual community ceremonies on Memorial Day and Veterans Day, and through the administration of the country's only memorial dedicated to those servicemen and servicewomen who have died in the Iraq and Afghanistan conflicts – the Northwood Gratitude and Honor Memorial at Northwood Community Park.

Memorials and Recognition

The City of Irvine salutes our nation's military service members, both active duty and veterans, for their dedication, courage, accomplishments and sacrifices to protect our everyday freedoms. Irvine is proud to recognize and honor our service men and women at various events and ceremonies throughout the year.

Colonel Bill Barber Marine Corps Memorial Community Park

Bill Barber is a Medal of Honor recipient who served in WWII, Korea and Vietnam. He was an Irvine resident until his passing in 2002. The Colonel Bill Barber Marine Corps Memorial Community Park is named in his honor. For a full biography, click here.

Mark Daily Athletic Field

Mark Daily grew up in Irvine and served in Operation Iraqi Freedom, where he was killed in action in January 2007. Military Memorial at the Flag Monument

The City maintains a Military Memorial at the Flag Monument of Colonel Bill Barber Marine Corps Memorial Park, which is reserved for plaques authorized by the City Council, honoring Irvine residents who died in the line of duty during military service as a permanent tribute to their service.

The City of Irvine takes pride in honoring Irvine's fallen service members and hometown heroes. These heroes will be forever remembered not only for their service to America, but for their roles in their families and their community.

Northwood Gratitude and Honor Memorial

The Northwood Gratitude and Honor Memorial honors every fallen service member who served in Operation Enduring Freedom in Afghanistan and Operation Iraqi Freedom in Iraq. It was the first permanent memorial in the country dedicated to these service members and to list all the fallen from these two wars. It was dedicated on November 14, 2010.

Military Banner Program

The Military Banner Program is proud to recognize and pay tribute to Irvine's military heroes for their sacrifice and service through programs such as the City's Military Banner Program. Family members and loved ones may nominate an active duty service member from any branch of the military to be honored with a street banner with the individual's name and photo. The banner will be prominently displayed on Culver Drive throughout their tour of duty. Service members must be current Irvine residents or immediate family of an Irvine resident to apply.

Proposed Southern California State Veterans Cemetery

In 2014, Assembly Bill 1453 (AB 1453) was introduced in the California legislature to establish a Southern California Veterans Cemetery in Orange County (by former California Assemblymember Quirk-Silva) in the California legislature proposing to establish a Southern California Veterans Cemetery in Orange County. The legislation, co-sponsored by Assemblymember Donald Wagner representing the City of Irvine, was approved by the State legislature as of August 25, signed by Governor Brown on September 27, 2014 and is effective January 1, 2015.

On March 11, 2014 the Irvine City Council adopted Resolution No. 14-27, which, in part, supported the passage of AB 1453 and expressed the City Council's strong interest in providing land at the Orange County Great Park to develop a State Veterans Cemetery. The City Council also established an Ad Hoc State Veterans Cemetery Committee to consider this matter. The Ad Hoc Committee was comprised of Irvine Mayor Steven Choi, Mayor Pro Tem Jeffrey Lalloway, a representative of Five Point Communities Management, Inc., a representative from the California Department of Veterans Affairs, and two members representing veterans groups.

On <u>July 22, 2014</u> the Irvine City Council adopted <u>Resolution No. 14-92</u> expressing its intent to convey the Amended and Restated Development Agreement (ARDA) Transfer Site (at the former Marine Corps Air Station, El Toro) to the State for the purposes of creating the <u>Southern California Veterans Memorial Park and Cemetery</u>, subject to all necessary and appropriate studies, procedures and agreements with the State and Federal governments.

AB 1453 directs the California Department of Veterans Affairs (CalVet), in voluntary cooperation with local government entities in Orange County, to design, develop, construct and equip a state-owned and operated Southern California Veterans Cemetery. It also directs CalVet to apply for federal Veterans Cemetery Grant Program funds for a Veterans Cemetery.

Next Steps

As a key initial step, AB 1453 directs the California Department of Veterans Affairs (CalVet) to submit a pre-application requesting Federal Veterans Cemetery Grant Funds (administered by U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs) to design, develop, construct and equip the cemetery.

CalVet indicates that it is working towards meeting next year's Federal grant pre-application deadline – July 1, 2016 – due to time required to complete the work necessary for submittal. CalVet shared that its next steps include hiring consultants to assist with the pre-application, determining burial rates and developing cost estimates. CalVet shared that they are unable to predict timing for this project beyond the July 1, 2016 pre-application submittal goal. This because the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs determines project eligibility, plus timing is dependent on the Federal Veterans Affairs' evaluation of applications received from all States. Employment and Hiring Benefits for Veterans

The City of Irvine is dedicated to providing benefits for full time employees who are active duty military personnel above and beyond what is required by federal and state laws. Full time City employees are eligible for up to one year of temporary partial pay while on military leave, and continue to have health insurance for themselves and their families. In addition to the above benefits, veterans also receive additional consideration when applying for positions with the City of Irvine. In the event that a veteran has qualifications identical to those possessed by another applicant, based upon the veteran's and the other applicant's examinations, interviews, experience, education, training and work history, the hiring authority will grant a preference to the veteran.

Irvine 2/11 Marine Adoption Committee

The City of Irvine adopted the 2nd Battalion, 11th Marines (2/11 Marines) in April 2007 for the purpose of making a difference in the lives of military personnel and their families. The Adoption Committee hosts several events throughout the year to benefit the battalion, which is based in Camp Pendleton.
