

COMMUNITY OVERVIEW

The City of Irvine, one of the nation's largest master-planned communities, is a culturally diverse city of more than 276,000 residents encompassing 66 square miles in the heart of Orange County. In 2017, Irvine earned the distinction as the most fiscally healthy large city in the United States by Truth in Accounting, and Sunset Magazine ranked Irvine as one of the Best Places to Live in highlighting its 20 Western Dream Towns.

Irvine, the 15th largest city in the state, was the third-fastest growing in 2017, according to the California Department of Finance. Incorporated in 1971, Irvine has strategically grown into one of the safest cities in the country, promoting environmental stewardship, state-of-the-art transportation programs and systems, an enterprising business environment, stellar educational institutions, and a high quality of life. 
AMONG THE SAFEST

Irvine is one of the safest cities in America, with the lowest rate of violent crime per capita of any city in the nation with a population of 250,000 or more. Through the City Council's leadership, Irvine continually focuses resources on maintaining a safe environment for residents, businesses, and visitors. The City's strategies are based on the assumption that prevention is one of the most important and, in the long run, most cost-effective means of sustaining a safe and secure community.

RESOURCES

Total General Fund resources for fiscal year (FY) 2018-19 are budgeted at \$199.8 million, an increase of \$7.4 million, or 3.9 percent, from the previous fiscal year.

EXPENDITURES

The City's FY 2018-19 total General Fund budgeted expenditures are \$199.7 million, an increase of \$3.6 million, or 1.9 percent, from the previous fiscal year. Although Irvine's population has grown more than 30 percent in the past 10 years, adding pressure on service demands and infrastructure, the costs per resident have remained relatively flat over the same time period due to Irvine's dedication to strong fiscal accountability.

PROPERTY TAX BREAKDOWN


