- ✓ Improvements to athletic fields and open spaces in our parks to promote active and passive use; focusing on turf replacement, drainage infrastructure, and use of drought tolerant plants
- ✓ Athletic Fields (18) Soccer Turf & Drainage \$4.4 million
- ✓ Turf Improvements (4) Great Park Soccer Fields and Baseball stadium \$4.0 million
- ✓ Drought Tolerant Planting and Drip Irrigation (6) \$650,000
- ✓ Planting of 400 park trees citywide to enhance the natural environment and provide shade opportunities \$125,000

Continuing responsible investment in key infrastructure, including affordable housing and municipal broadband

- Set aside funding for future investment in temporary, transitional and/or affordable housing projects, to be determined in consultation with the Irvine Community Land Trust and the City Council
- Engage a consultant for a study of broadband enhancement solutions to recommend suitable options to the City Council, including lessons from municipalities where mistakes were made. Set aside funds to implement relevant recommendations from the study

Be Well OC



- Experience developing and implementing mental health and addiction related service throughout Orange County
- Currently implementing Mobile Crisis Response Teams in Orange County
- Has embedded representatives who are familiar with the nationally recognized CAHOOTS model pioneered in Eugene, Oregon
- June 2021, City Council approved entering into an MOU with Be Well OC







Be Well - Irvine



- Team of crisis counselors
- Respond to non-emergency, non-violent incidents involving:
 - Mental illness
 - Homelessness
 - Substance abuse disorders
 - Parenting challenges
- City Council contract consideration in November
- Irvine program could begin December 2021









One Irvine – Program



- One Irvine is a community reinvestment program aimed at bringing a variety of focused resources to targeted neighborhoods
- North El Camino Real has been selected as the first target neighborhood
- Implementation of the program includes:
 - Funding and fee waivers for residential upgrades
 - Educational materials
 - Engagement with Code Enforcement team to administer the Municipal and Zoning Code as necessary
 - Undertaking a catalytic project in the neighborhood to demonstrate the City's commitment to the neighborhood









One Irvine – ARPA



- Total of \$5 million to be used over three years across multiple neighborhoods (including capital projects)
- Permit Fee Holiday for certain residential reinvestment projects
- Grant and Loan Programs to support reinvestment (including admin cost)
 - No-interest loans up to \$25,000 per household
 - Grants for up to \$1,000 per household
- Eligible projects focused on front yard aesthetics and environmental sustainability
 - Exterior paint
 - Landscaping and driveway repair
 - Window replacement, roof repair
 - EV charger installation
