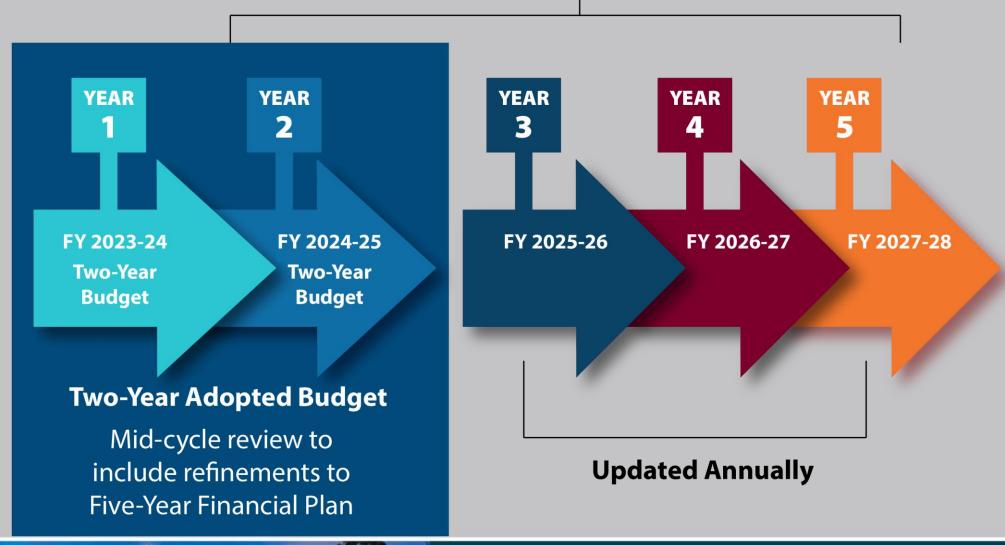

 - Economic slowdown, labor market, and increasing costs

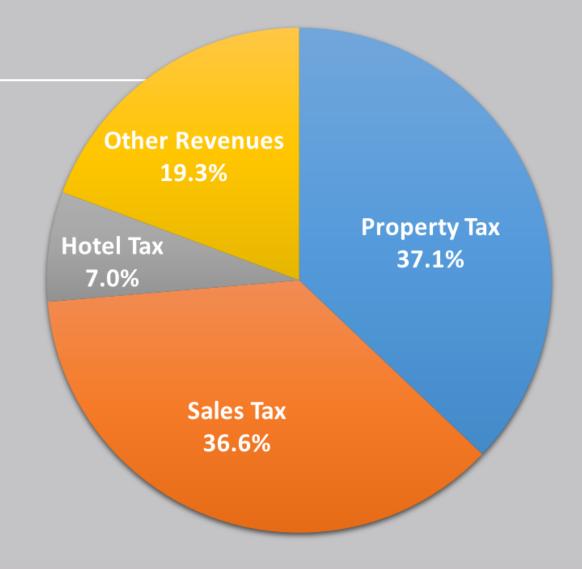

General Fund Revenues

- Top 3 revenues make up 81% of General Fund
- Revenues have recovered from the COVID-19 pandemic
- Stabilized growth in FY 2023-25 budget
- Monitoring economic slowdown and challenges







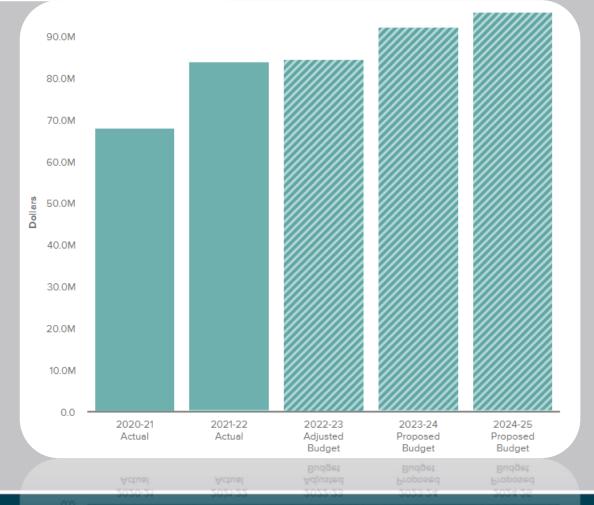
Property Tax



- Largest revenue source
- Irvine's assessed valuation from OC: \$100 billion
 - Prior sales and market value increases added value to the City
- Higher interest rates and slowdown in market result in slightly lower growth rate

Sales Tax

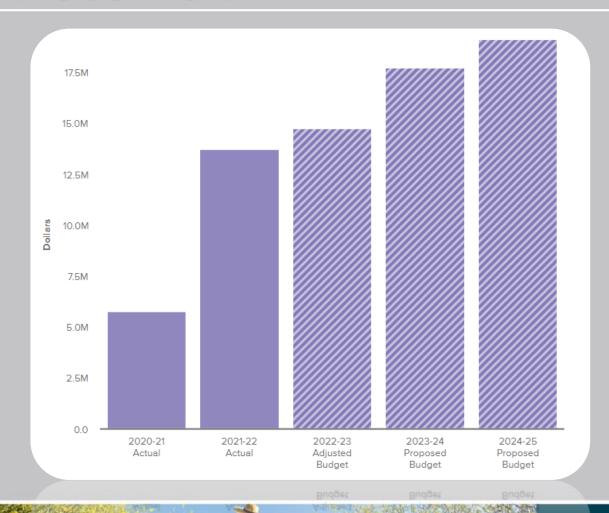
- Experiencing higher consumer spending in:
 - Sit-down casual dining
 - Automobile sales
 - Business-industry gains
- Outperforming surrounding areas, including the State
- Volatile to external factors







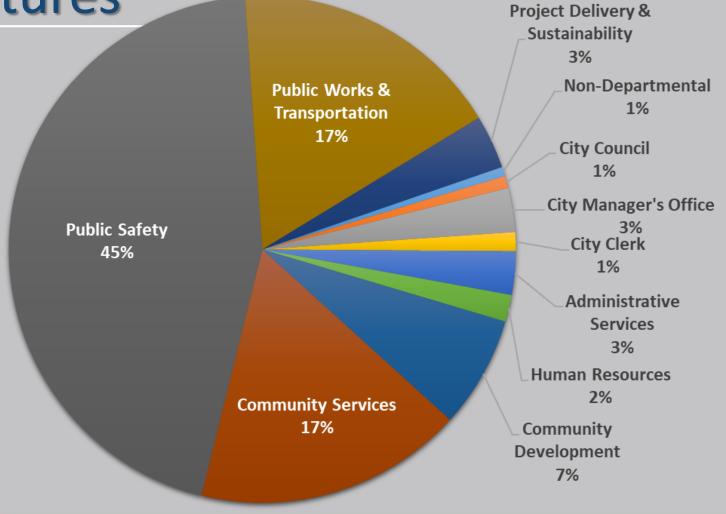
Hotel Tax



- Heavily impacted by COVID-19 due to closures and restrictions
- Occupancy still lower than pre-COVID-19 levels, but offset by higher rates
- Nature of travel shifting from business to leisure travel
- 23 hotels located in Irvine

General Fund Expenditures

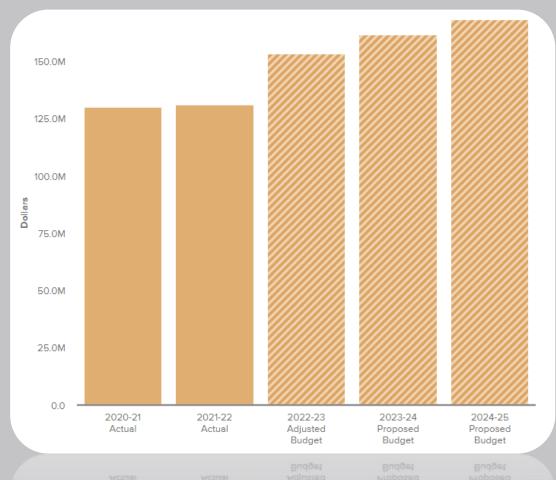
- Managing expenses while improving City services
 - Of note, the City recently implemented a reorganization plan to emphasize capital project delivery, sustainability efforts, and health / wellness activities







Salaries & Benefits



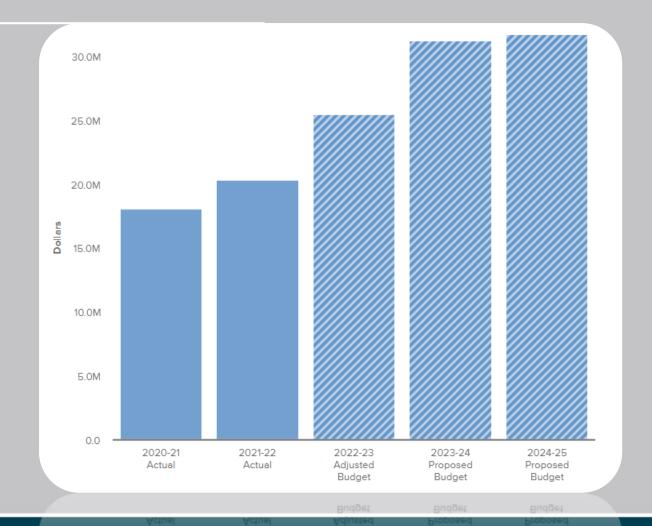
City enhancements:

- 10 position upgrades from Extended Part-Time to Full-Time
- 5 additional Special Fund Full-Time positions
- Includes latest MOU agreement
- Continuing CalPERS additional payments to lower future costs



Contract Services

- City experiencing increasing costs across the board, with the most pronounced impacts seen in construction, labor, and materials expenditures
- Reallocation of facilities rehabilitation services from Special Funds to General Fund

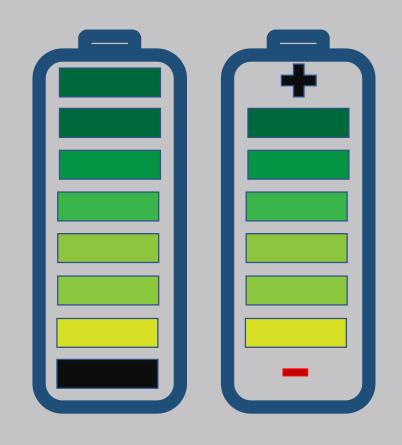






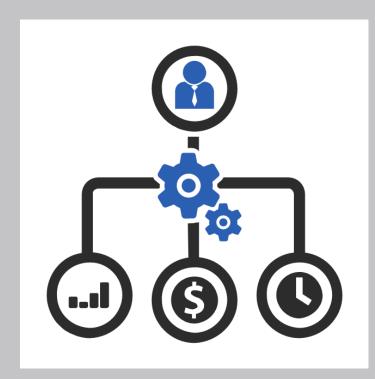
Contingency Reserve

- City Council goal to maintain a contingency reserve level of 25%
- As General Fund expenditures increase, the reserve level percentage decreases
- Projected balance: \$59.1 million
- Projected reserve level: 24.5%
- Replenishing reserve levels are considered during the end of each fiscal year





Capital Improvement Program



\$85 Million in Projects over Two Years



Featured projects:

- Intersection enhancements
- Pavement rehabilitation
- Traffic signal vehicle and bicycle detection system
- Woodbridge pickleball courts
- Oak Creek Community Park improvements
- Great Park synthetic turf installation
- Bill Barber Gymnasium Council directed project to proceed. Details will be brought back when the project is ready.
