#### **Project Description**

All living creatures undergo change whether it be a shedding of antlers, a transformation from larva to pupa, or — as in various mythological and literary traditions — from animal to human and vice versa. Blue Wall, featuring contributions by nearly two dozen artists (members of Lynk Collective and guest artists), is a sequel to the 2022 installation entitled *Our Time on a Wall of Red. Blue Wall* serves as a follow-up piece and invites viewers to first see a field of rich monochromatic color with individual images revealing themselves upon further examination.

## **Project Description**

In the field of psychology, the "cocoon stage" is described as a time of self-reflection during which a person confronts habitual ways of action and contemplates how to change them. The cocoon serves a protective space for growth — a vessel for a person's innermost needs, desires, and comforts. Inspired by this concept, each tea bag in *Cocoon* features a symbol



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that stands in for a dream, a security, a fear, a goal, a community. Materials used to create the artwork include recycled wrappers, bandages, gauzes, metals, and used teabags. Printmaking techniques employed to create the prints inside the *Cocoon* include relief, intaglio, monoprint, paper lithography, pronto plate, tetra pak, woodcut, and linocut.

The artwork proposes that to make a change, one has to first establish what is important, what one wants to keep and gain.

What place do you consider your cocoon?
What do you need your cocoon to protect you from?
What do you do when you withdraw into your cocoon?
What would you like to have in your cocoon?
What symbolizes change in the world or in yourself?

#### **Project Description**

When a spider web's filaments are damaged, the structure breaks down and its intricately connected avenues of survival are disrupted. Similarly, our connection with the natural world is breaking down; we must recognize how humans are weakening the integrity of natural interconnections and put a halt to the alarming erosion of our planet's avenues of survival. All is hanging by a thread. The artwork titled *A Fragile Web* consists of the word "fragile" written in various languages and woven together with renderings of endangered flora and fauna. It is drawn with natural fibers and assembled into a collective fabrication.

# Hesperides, 2025

#### **Project Description**

Hesperides is a collaborative installation of prints on mulberry paper made by nine artists using various techniques. Each artist draws inspiration from the nourishing, restorative qualities of the plant world and the fragile balance between humans and other species,



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as well as the Greek mythology of the Hesperides. Associated with the Greek gods Hera and Zeus, the Hesperides were golden-voiced nymphs who tended an idyllic garden at the western edge of the world. When the Argonauts violated their shores in need of water, the Hesperides responded with openness and compassion, metamorphosing into trees — a poplar tree, a willow tree, and an elm tree — and guided the Argonauts to the redemption of a freshwater spring.

# Lágrimas de las Chicharras, 2025

#### **Project Description**

Lágrimas de las Chicharras is an installation made of relief prints, wire, amate, paper pulp, and sisal rope that explores the cycles of transformation and renewal. Inspired by the distinct cries of cicadas, the artwork aims to capture the dualities of change and the delicate balance between endings and beginnings.

#### **Artist Statement**

"A collaboration between myself and my immediate surroundings stored in a ball.

The performance is a way to relate to my surroundings by paying attention, being non-judgmental, and by looking. It is in contrast to the way that one can too often separate oneself from those experiences by getting lost in oneself."

Metamorphosis: Mending the Wound is an exhibition organized by Lynk Collective that features printmaking and mixed media art that explores themes of transformation, fragmentation, and rehabilitation through strategies of collaboration and assembly.
