# My child has a disability and requires child care services

## Title II: ADA

Requires that Child Care providers not discriminate against persons with disabilities on the basis of disability.

Centers cannot exclude children with disabilities from programs unless their presence would pose a direct threat to the health or safety of others or require a fundamental alteration of the program.

Centers must provide appropriate auxiliary aids and services needed for effective communication with children or adults with disabilities, when doing so would not constitute an undue burden.

Centers must generally make their facilities accessible to persons with disabilities. Existing facilities are subject to the readily achievable standard for barrier removal, while newly constructed facilities and any altered portions of existing facilities, must be fully accessible.

## ONCE YOU HAVE SELECTED A PROGRAM HERE ARE THE STEPS TO TAKE

- 1. Call and ask about availability, tuition fees, and program requirements.
- 2. If a program seems suitable for your child, schedule a tour.
- 3. Schedule a meeting with the director to evaluate the individual needs of your child.
- 4. If a provider refuses care, request an explanation for refusal of service. if you have additional questions, contact ADA at 800-514-0301
- 5. Once your child is enrolled in a child care program and if they, or the program require assistance, utilize any of the listed resources.

ADA law states that a program, before refusing admission, must make an individualized assessment of what the person with the disability requires to be fully integrated into that program.

Once they know what is needed, the program must assess if they can meet the particular needs of this child without fundamentally altering its program.

Child Care programs cannot reject a child simply because he/she needs individualized attention. Most children require individualized attention occasionally.

The ADA does not generally require centers to hire additional staff or provide constant one on one supervision of a particular child with a disability.

Child Care programs are not required to except children who would pose a direct threat to the health or safety of others or whose presence or necessary care would fundamentally alter the nature of the child care program.

If a program has a waiting list, Title III does not require providers to take children with disabilities first.
